

Introduction to the Parish Education Committee

Together with our Pastor Father Paul Smith and Principal Miss Colette Foran, the Parish Education Committee (PEC) is responsible for the running of the school.

- The Pastor is responsible for faith development and is the Archbishop's Representative.
- The Principal is responsible for the administration and educational component of the school community.
- The PEC is responsible for the business operations of the school; it prepares the budget for the operation and maintenance of the school, ensures the school maintains accurate records, hires teachers and staff with the approval of the Pastor, and more.

The PEC does not work in isolation. ICS is one of 46 parochial schools within the Catholic Independent Schools of the Vancouver Archdiocese (CISVA). The CISVA governs both elementary and high schools within the Catholic schools in Vancouver. The PEC makes decisions and sets policy to govern the school, providing these decisions fall within the CISVA Board's policies and regulations.

The PEC is composed of active members of the Immaculate Conception Parish (not necessarily parents of students) and the Pastor. Members serve two year terms (up to a maximum of four terms).

The PEC meets once a month with Father Paul, Miss Foran and a representative from the teaching staff. Mrs. Weaver has been the staff representative for the 2014/2015 school year. Meeting minutes are posted on the secure section of the school website. Parents are always welcome to join the meeting as observers. If parents wish to present an issue of concern to the PEC, they may do so with seven day written notice to the Chair.

This report is a summary of a few key areas of the PEC's work this past year, namely:

- Operating revenue and expenses.
- Changes to the Parent Participation Program.
- Outcomes of fundraising efforts.
- Ongoing grounds and maintenance.
- Strategic Plan.

Parent Participation ~ spirit of community

One of the biggest reasons our community is so strong, and our school has so many programs, given its size, is because of parent participation. Active participation provides positive role modelling for our students, while teaching them the value of helping others, as in our motto "service to others". Most importantly, parent participation makes enrollment at Immaculate Conception a family affair.

The Parent Participation Program is an integral part in the operation of our school. The aim of the program is to create a spirit of community among families and staff as we work together to provide the best education for our students.

There are countless opportunities for families to participate in our school community. Some examples of these opportunities include playground supervision, being a garden buddy or a class parent, baking, coordinating class special events, Walkathon volunteer, Sports Day volunteer, and the list goes on and on.

This year we implemented a few changes to make the Parent Participation Program more equitable, run more smoothly, and increase parent participation opportunities. The main changes include an additional three mandatory hours for the grade event; limiting the numbers of hours that can be claimed for specific jobs/events, and required approval by the class parent or coordinators for submission of hours. These changes made a marked difference as we saw a significant increase in participation over the last year, with 96% of families now actively involved. While the parent participation requirement is 40 hours per family per year, most of families go above and beyond, with some families logging more than 120 hours. This highlights one of our key strengths as a community. We aim to match families' talents with the school's needs and we will continue to solicit input from families to make this program even stronger.

New Uniform




New website


Audited operating revenue and expenses

ICS' revenue is made up of three parts: the Ministry of Education grant (51%, based on number of students), tuition fees (41%) paid by families, and funds raised (6%). As a non-profit we budget to break even every year but if revenues come in ahead of the budget we may choose to spend some of the extra revenue and/or save it for future years. The charts below are based on audited 2013/2014 financials (2014/2015 audited financials are not available as of this Annual Report's print date).









Total Expenses (2013/2014 audited): \$1,651,607

Administration, instructional staffing and direct instructional expenses account for 80% of total school expenses. Capital expenditures in 2013/2014 (\$38,415) included upgrades to furniture, as well as purchase of additional Macbooks.

Grounds and Maintenance

Grounds and Maintenance is an essential role of the PEC - to ensure that the school facilities and grounds are safe and functional. In addition to the routine maintenance (janitorial services, painting, pest control, etc.) many necessary upgrades and renovations were done throughout the school in the past year. With the help of many parents, we installed benches and hooks in the gym change rooms, installed Kindergarten cubbies and hooks, upgraded the Grade 6 classroom, renovated the school office, upgraded the school security camera, upgraded the sound system, installed a big screen projector in the gym, installed signage outside the school, removed the sandboxes, upgraded the vegetable planters and sprinklers, installed a compost area for the ICS community garden and installed pigeon strips to prevent roof roamers.

Fundraising and Donations ~ reflection of a generous community

The ICS community raises funds to supplement the excellent academic, sport and cultural programs we provide for our students and to cover many of the operating costs of our school. Our two biggest annual fundraisers are the Walkathon and the Christmas Fair. Not only do these events raise much needed funds for our school but they help us build a strong and vibrant school community. We also raise funds throughout the year for our many outreach projects.

During this year's Walkathon we raised \$35,197 - with an amazing 97% family participation. This high level of participation qualified us for the additional anonymous donation of \$5,000, bringing the total to over \$40,000. Each year, regardless of how much we raise at the Walkathon we always donate \$3,000 to two school-related projects, one in Vietnam and one in Haiti. \$1,500 is donated to the Nguyen Tat Thanh School in Vietnam, which we have been supporting for more than a decade. Another \$1,500 is donated to the Salesian Missions which focus on supporting youth in Haitian schools.

The very popular Christmas Fair is not just a school event, it has become a Dunbar community event. In 2014 it attracted over 500 attendees and we raised a record breaking \$76,962! A truly remarkable effort by all.

While most of our fundraising money is allocated to covering our operating costs, it has allowed us to take on larger projects such as the staff room and office renovations, and providing Macbooks, iPads and document cameras (digital overhead projectors) for the students and teachers in the last two years. This year, necessary upgrades were also made to the library database management system.

It is worth noting that occasionally the school also receives gifts and donations from sponsors, alumni and families. In the past few years, these donations have helped with the purchase of computers, building the school garden, setting up a guitar program, providing additional enrichment opportunities for the students such as the Vancouver Aquarium Aquavan, and upgrading the general facilities. The school is very grateful for the generous support from the school and parish community through giving of time, talents and financial resources.

Strategic Plan ~ building a thriving community

At the beginning of the year the PEC had a half day facilitated workshop to clarify and align our understanding of the key issues, opportunities and challenges facing the school, using prior SWOT¹ analyses to inform the process. We agreed on four key strategic imperatives (critical areas of concern and/or opportunities - top row of table below) and developed a strategic plan for addressing them. We then defined and prioritised goals and have been developing action plans to implement them. The PEC is using this plan as a key tool to achieve our vision for the school in the medium to long term. Please note that while these imperatives are not directly related to educational programming (which is the purview of the Principal) they strongly support it. Progress has been steady and we hope to have much to report in the upcoming year.
